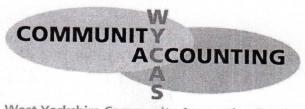

### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was formed on 20 May 2009. It is governed by a memorandum and articles of association as amended by special resolution on 18 October 2010. The liability of the members in the event of the company being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding £10.

### Method of recruitment and appointment of trustees

The members of the charity may be ordinary resolution appoint a person who is willing to act as a trustee. A company limited by guarentee without a share capital.

### Trustees' report (continued) for the year ended 31 May 2017

### Objectives and activities

### The charity's objects

To reduce homelessness in such ways as maybe thought fit within the context of Christian values and practice, based on the biblical mandate to love our neighbour as ourselves;

To support, advise and accommodate the homeless and inadequately housed in partnership with local churches and other organisations and individuals as the trustees from time to time may think fit;

To fulfil other purposes which are exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales that are connected with the charitable work of the charity;

### Public benefit statement

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty in section 4 of the 2006 Charities Act to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties.

### Achievements and performance

Hope Housing has continued to deliver the Bradford 'No Second Night Out' contract in partnership with Developing Initiative Supporting Communities (DISC), a larger charity. The work of the charity has remained focused on trying to support clients throughout their housing journey from rough sleeping/ homelessness to supported/independent accommodation. Excellent results have been seen around sustainability of clients' long term housing. The staff of Hope Housing have continued to develop expertise in helping clients with the most complex cases and needs.

Hope Housing has also continued with our supported housing provision enabling high quality recovery support to our clients. Our application for exempt accommodation status to ensure the ongoing viability of this provision was finally agreed by the local council early in 2017. However, we were still awaiting considerable back pay in Housing Benefit at the end of this financial year which has presented us with potential challenges in terms of future financial security.

Hope Housing continued to take the lead on the Cold Weather Provision (CWP) for Bradford on behalf of Bradford Council, coordinating extra temporary bed spaces for the homeless of Bradford when the temperature dropped below zero, . This year we co-ordinated CWP accommodation for 114 individuals and helped move 41 people into longer term accommodation. It's great to see the continued partnerships with organisations across the City which make this work.

We have been really pleased to be able to start our supported lodgings scheme this year, where clients are placed in volunteers homes for medium term support. This has also coincided with the end of our emergency hosting scheme. We are very thankful for all of our volunteer hosts who have accommodated homeless people in their homes over the years.

In terms of funding of the work of the charity this has been through a combination of regular and one off donations from our faithful and generous individual supporters. Our work has also been supported financially by the continuation of a number of large grants from charitable trusts and businesses secured in previous years. However, a number of these ended in this financial year and sadly we had to lose a number of posts and staff who were funded specifically through these grants, including our Volunteer Coordinator and Pathways out of Homelessness worker. The charity had a number of further grant applications submitted and we were awaiting the outcome of these at the end of this reporting year.

## Trustees' report (continued) for the year ended 31 May 2017

### Achievements and performance continued

During this year have been able to help 227 people off the streets into our emergency No Second Night out hostel. Over 140 accessed outreach support, 21 supported tenancy bed spaces and 1 Supported lodgings placement. We are especially proud of our 11 destitute bed spaces across all of our provision to be able to accommodate homeless people who are unable to pay, claim benefits and often unable to work.



One of our clients, faithfully supported by our volunteer, Elaine. He was accommodated at our emergency hostel, Discovery House and moved into our support tenancies. He has been supported out of alcohol addiction and into paid work.

### Financial review

The net expenditure for the year was £1,984, including net income of £24,188 on unrestricted funds and net expenditure of £26,172 on restricted funds.

### Reserves policy

The charity's free reserves, excluding fixed assets, at the year end were £34,606.

The trustees have established as a matter of policy that the aim of the charity is to have reserves that represent three months of operating costs of the charity.

Budgeted expenditure for the year to 31 May 2017 is £120,688 which would require a minimum reserve of £30,172.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees report and the financial statements in accordance with the applicable law and UK Accounting Standards.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;

observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;

prepare the accounts on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Charities SORP (FRS102)), and in accordance with the special provisions of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

# Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Hope Housing (Bradford) LTD

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the charitable company for the year ended 31 May 2017, which are set out on pages 7 to 13.

### Responsibilities and basis of report

### 1 Accounting policies

### **Basis of accounting**

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

## Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice In preparing the accounts

The trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required. They have determined that no such restatement is required.

As a consequence, there has been no change to the accounting policies since last year. No changes have been made to the accounts for previous years.

### Going concern

The trustees are satisfied that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

### Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Where grants are related to performance and specific deliverables, they are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

### Expenditure and liabilities

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out the resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

### **Taxation**

As a charity the organisation benefits from rates relief and is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition. Gifted assets are shown at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives.

### Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. The costs of contributions are recognised in the year they are payable.

### 1 Accounting policies continued

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.

#### Leases

Rents under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term or to an earlier date if the lease can be determined without financial penalty.
